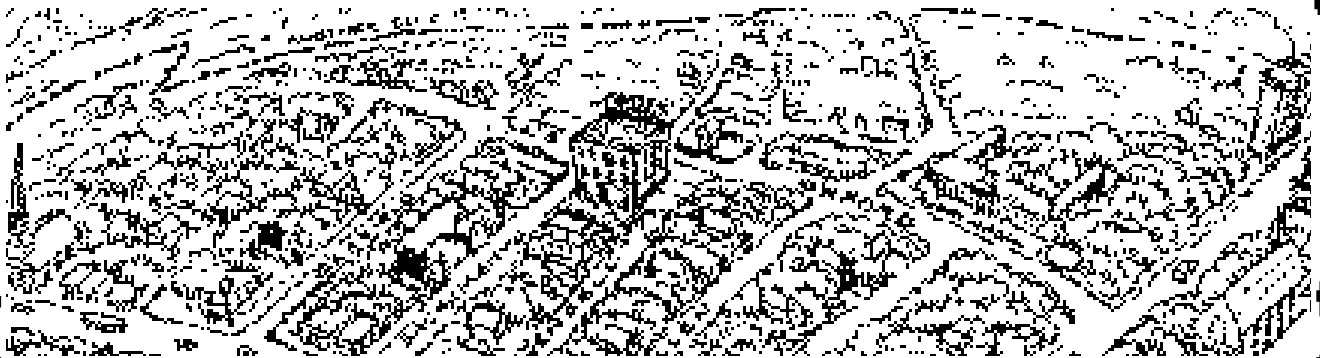

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## v ANC News v

### Summary of ANC meeting, 6/19/01

Lesley University was represented by **David Erlandson, Steve Shulman and Paul Karoff**. Karoff presented Lesley's current plan to meet the condition of their 1996 zoning variance for 13 Mellen St and 16 Wendell St. That variance specified that the dormitory at 10 Sacramento Street be sold and returned to residential use by December, 2001.

Lesley will apply for a lodging license for 28R Wendell St. (the rear of two brick buildings near the tennis court), now used for administration. If the license is granted, Lesley will use 28R Wendell to house the Threshold program students who are now in #10 Sacramento. Depending on fall enrollments, Lesley might still need 10 Sacramento St for 10-12 other students, just for the fall term. But at the latest, Lesley would be able to vacate 10 Sacramento by December 18, 2001 (the variance specified December 11). No one present expressed objection to the possible extra week at 10 Sacramento, but several community members urged Lesley to consult with the neighbors of 28R Wendell. Glenn Leblanc, from the 14-unit apartment building at 28 Wendell, was present at this meeting (as a result of flyers distributed by Lesley), and expressed concern about possible noise from students. Lesley agreed to make another publicity effort directed at abutters, prior to the license hearing in late July.

There was extended discussion of ways to deal with excessive noise from student residents of the neighborhood, especially outside at night in the summer. Several abutters of dormitories complained that neither talking to RA's nor calling Lesley Security seemed to work for very long. Lesley representatives said that the practice of having RA's for the dorms introduce themselves to abutters at the beginning of each academic year would be re-emphasized at Lesley's orientation for RA's this fall. Linda Brion-Meisels noted that in the past the Lesley-Agassiz Committee had successfully dealt with such problems, and urged neighbors to try that avenue. 28R Wendell might be expected to generate fewer noise problems

for neighbors, since it lies within the Lesley campus. It was suggested that the entrance to 28R Wendell be relocated to face the campus rather than Wendell St., but this is likely to be very expensive. Another proposal was to set up an outdoor lounge area (with benches and ashtrays) on the campus side of the building and/or prohibit students from congregating on the Wendell St. side.

Lesley reported that several parties have expressed interest in buying 10 Sacramento St. Lesley will move forward with the sale as soon as they have received legal clarification on the building's zoning status. Although the Board of Zoning Appeal's variance specified 3 units were to be returned to residential use, present zoning of the area is 2-family. Faith Chase noted that, since the building is already handicap-accessible, it would be appropriate for elderly housing. Others expressed concern about avenues for further neighborhood input on the status of 10 Sacramento; some guarantee that the property will remain residential after the sale, 2 units over 3, and preservation of the large tree in the back yard. Lesley agreed to notify those who were present at the meeting of further developments with BZA over the summer (by e-mail; if you wish to be included in such notice, notify the ANC or Paul Karoff at Lesley). Even if there are no further developments, Lesley will update interested residents at a meeting in August.

Lesley also wants representatives from ANC to serve on their committee for a long-range plan for space and facilities. The administration and other Lesley constituencies are now working on this plan, and Lesley will present an outline to ANC sometime after October 15. If you are interested in serving on the committee, notify ANC.

### Harvard Construction in Agassiz

#### 60 Oxford Street

Harvard University has begun construction on a building to house their information systems group at the corner of Hammond and Oxford St. The building design was considered at several community meetings early this year, and the construction began this summer.

As the work progressed, residents from Oxford and Hammond Streets contacted Cambridge Inspectional Services with concerns that included noise, personal safety, safety of property and structural safety of the close buildings, particularly in reference to the vibrations from pile driving. There was concern about work beginning too early and on Saturday,



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and when residents complained, nothing was done. They requested that Harvard provide them with further construction information and an explanation of steps to be taken to remedy their concerns.


Harvard produced documents to assure residents that vibrations were being monitored, concerns were being handled and when contractors began early or made excessive noise, attempts were made to contain them.

Currently the work is focused on the excavation of the basement, and this will continue through October. There are three stages to this process: preliminary excavation to the level of required steel bracing (approximately ten feet below grade), installation of the steel bracing, and final excavation to the depth of the foundation. This process will begin in the northwest corner of the building site, moving then to the west half and finally to the east half. heavy equipment on site will consist primarily of excavators and heavy trucks. During this process there may be intermittent drilling to break existing concrete foundations that we anticipate have been buried from the WWI era structure previously on the site.

#### Proposed Garage at Hammond/Gorham Edge

This summer three meetings were planned for residents to learn more about the proposal by Harvard to put their parking underground in the vicinity of the Hammond/Gorham edge. In these preliminary discussions, Arrowstreet, Inc., project architects, presented the initial design. Additional consultants included Haley and Aldrich, underground engineers, and TAMS, traffic specialists. The third meeting was held as *The Whistler* went to press.

More information on this project and construction at 60 Oxford Street will be discussed at the September 24 ANC monthly meeting.

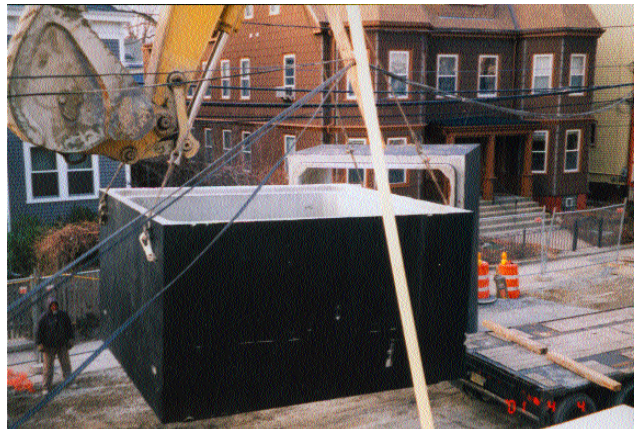

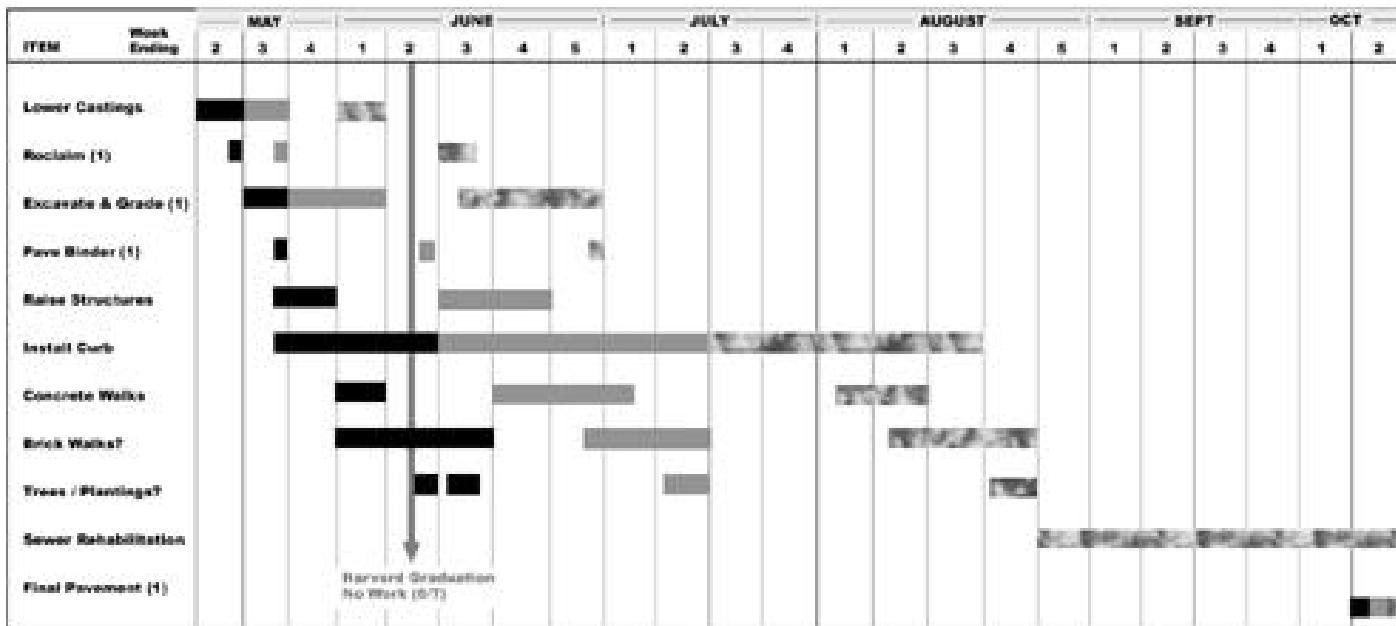
**Sewer Construction**

### Update: Danehy Park Family Day

The City of Cambridge will host the Sixth Annual Danehy Park Family Day on Saturday, September 22, from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. (Raindate: Sunday, September 23). Danehy Park is a 55-acre facility at 99 Sherman Street.

This free event, which draws over 3,500 people annually, is one of our biggest events of the year and requires a lot of volunteers to make it work. Each volunteer will also receive a free staff T-shirt.

Danehy Park Family Day offers a variety of activities and entertainment for families, including amusement rides, arts and crafts, dance lessons, face painting, live music, magic shows, roving performers, etc. Approximately 1,200 kites will be distributed to kids to fly over the park.

Shuttle buses will be providing free transportation from the Alewife MBTA Station and a number of key points in Cambridge. Danehy Park can also be reached by public transportation, taking the #83 bus from Central Square or the #74 bus from Harvard Square.

### Pay Parking Tickets On-Line!

In early September, the City expects to go live with the capability to enable people to pay parking tickets on-line. This is the first phase of a series of e-government initiatives we will be implementing over the next four months, which will include on-line payment of Real Estate Taxes, Personal Property Taxes, Motor Vehicle Excise Taxes and Water/Sewer Payments. The goal is to continue to develop new and convenient ways for residents, business owners and others to interact with City government.

### BZA Has Two Vacancies to Fill

City Manager Robert W. Healy is seeking to fill two associate member vacancies on the Cambridge Board of Zoning Appeal (BZA). The BZA reviews applications for variances and special permits in accordance with the Cambridge Zoning Ordinance. They also act on appeals from zoning decisions of the Commissioner of Inspectional Services. BZA members must be residents of the City of Cambridge. The board meets twice per month on Thursday evenings. Interested persons should submit a letter describing applicable experience by September 28 to the City Manager's Office.

### Planning Board Vacancy

City Manager Robert W. Healy is seeking to fill a vacancy on the Cambridge Planning Board. The Planning Board is the Special Permit granting authority for the city, responsible for

review of special permit requests, review and development of zoning proposals and the study of land use in the city. The Board meets approximately twice a month on Tuesday evenings. Planning Board members must be residents of the City of Cambridge. Interested persons should submit a letter describing applicable experience to the Office of the City Manager by Friday, Sept 14.

**Mobius presents "This Is A Test,"** an installation created by Brockton teens who have strong opinions about standardized testing on September 12-29, gallery hours, Wed.-Sat., 12-5 pm; opening reception and gallery talk, Sat., September 15, 3-5 pm. at Mobius, 354 Congress St., Boston. The events are free and open to the public; call (617) 542-7416.

"This Is A Test" artistically examines MCAS, the much debated state assessment test. Under the guidance of Mobius Artists Group member, Margaret B. Tittlemore, a band of ten Teen Docents from the Fuller Museum of Art (FMA) in Brockton have created a multimedia installation that conveys their thoughts and feelings regarding MCAS and the predominant role it now plays in their education.

The idea for the project, recently exhibited at the FMA, was generated through group discussions among the teens during their after-school Teen Docent program at the FMA. The program, which employs girls from Brockton High School as gallery interpreters and mentors for elementary school age girls, guides the teens on how to use contemporary art on exhibit at the FMA as springboards for discussing social and political issues such as teen pregnancy, life-long goals, and peer pressure. Upon viewing an installation by Tittlemore and other artists exhibiting at the FMA, the teens decided that they wanted to create their own reactionary piece about MCAS and its effect on the psyche of the average high school student in Massachusetts. The resulting installation represents both a teenage girl's bedroom and her brain. In the bedroom, MCAS statistics are layered on personal items, and furniture is plastered with articles and editorials debating MCAS. In the brain, a pinpoint of light illuminates the room as the "inner voices" of the teens speak of their hopes and

fears as they approach the test. Visitors may explore both the internal and external worlds of the average teenager and how the heavily weighted test affects them.
