October 15 ANC Meeting

Willie Bloomstein, ANC Vice Chair, welcomed residents. He informed them that Harvard would describe construction mitigation plans for the underground garage.

Mary Power and Michelle Kang from Harvard's Office for Community Affairs were on hand as was Charlie Connor, of William A. Berry & Sons, new Mitigation Management Director. Mary introduced others from Harvard in attendance including Lois Stanley, Andrea Shen, Bob Mitchell and Robert Mortimer.

Mary Power described Harvard's commitment to making sure that garage construction goes as smoothly as possible and emphasized the importance of communication and understanding neighborhood concerns. Charlie Connor, Harvard's Mitigation Management, Director summarized Harvard's mitigation plans for the garage project:

Work hours:

- Monday through Friday, 7 a.m to 6 p.m.
- Saturday hours will be scheduled (with advance notice to residents) between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. when absolutely necessary
- No Sunday and Holiday construction

Noise:

- On-site monitoring of noise from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- On-site monitoring by the project managers.
- All equipment will be certified before arriving on-site (relating to noise level).
- The noise level is a maximum of 85/95 dba's (this is an estimate) depending on the type of project assigned for that day/time period/activity

Dust Control

- Process includes covering, wetting, and ground covers
- The site is enclosed with 20 foot high permanent fence (necessary for buffering)

Harvard Construction Issues Update

Palfrey House moves to its temporary location

Palfrey House will be moved to its temporary location behind Conant Hall on Oxford Street on Saturday, November 23. In order to maximize the use of daylight hours, the move will begin at 7 AM and will be completed by nightfall. Once the garage project is complete, Palfrey House will be moved to its permanent location on Hammond Street.

University Information Systems building nearing completion

Construction of the University Information Systems (UIS) building at 60 Oxford Street is nearing completion and will be partially occupied beginning on November 12. Updates about the schedule and work on the UIS building can be obtained through the website www.sixtyoxford.harvard.edu or on the information board on Hammond Street. A community open house is planned for later this year to welcome neighbors to the new building.

The Oxford Street Parking Facility

Harvard has now begun construction of the underground Oxford Street Parking Facility and has met with neighbors regarding construction planning. The 20-foot tall wood fence to be built around the perimeter of the garage site will be put into place in mid to late November. All truck traffic related to work on the Parking Facility will be required to go south on Oxford Street.

North Campus planning

In the next year, Harvard would like to engage neighbors in a discussion about the planning framework for the north

Other Projects:

Over the course of the coming year, Mary Power stated that Harvard would like to discuss its planning framework for the north campus and the completion of the Hammond Street edge with a building that will be built atop the underground garage when it is completed (the North Sciences Building). In addition to the planning framework that was discussed at the ANC meetings last Winter, the Law School will study the feasibility of putting the Everett street garage parking underground to create an attractive quadrangle at the Mass. Ave./Everett corner. Mary Power stated that the new Agassiz-Harvard-City North Campus Planning Committee, to be appointed by the City, will play a major role including the review of new plans and the impact of development. Mary emphasized that Harvard will work with the ANC, the working committee and ACID to coordinate meetings with the community.

Beacon Street Sewer Work Begins in New Year Cities of Cambridge and Somerville Improvements Project Project Overview

Beacon Street Contract VI-3C project area is located in Cambridge and Somerville. The contract area includes Beacon Street between Oxford Street and Museum Street. The project proposes construction of stormwater management storage structures and storm drainpipe improvements to help reduce the severity and frequency of area street flooding. This project is a joint effort of the Cities of Cambridge and Somerville and is a continuation of the City of Cambridge efforts in the Agassiz area to eliminate combined sewer overflows to the Charles River and Alewife Brook and to reduce flooding impacts by improving drainage collection and discharge.

Why is this project necessary?

When stormwater flow exceeds the drainage system capacity, combined sewer overflows and street flooding occur. Flooding of surface roads and buildings containing both stormwater and sewage is a pervasive problem throughout the Agassiz area of Cambridge and Beacon Street in Somerville. Several of the lowest topographic elevations within the City of Cambridge are located in this area.

What is being done to fix the problem?

Three years ago, the Cambridge Department of Public Works (CDPW) initiated a stormwater management program to provide improved drainage service throughout the Agassiz area for storms up to a 25-year, 24-hour storm event. This amounts to a total of 5.5 inches of rain falling over a 24-hour time period. The essential features of the City of Cambridge program include the construction of underground stormwater storage tanks combined with new storm drains.


Work in the area of Crescent/Carver Streets; Wendell/ Hammond/Museum Streets; and Scott Street have already been finished. The next contract to be built is Contract VI-3C: Beacon Street. This project will include installation of two underground stormwater storage tanks under Beacon Street in the vicinity of Miller Street and Museum Street. As part of this project, new catch basins will also be installed on both sides of Beacon Street to collect street runoff from Prentiss Street to Museum Street. Raised crosswalks will be placed at the intersections of Beacon, Forest, Prentiss, Sacramento, Oxford and Museum Streets to direct street runoff to catch basins.

Localized street runoff collected from the catch basins will be discharged into the existing 48-inch diameter storm drain. Once the 48-inch diameter pipe is full, excess flows will be conveyed and stored in the two underground storage tanks. After the storm event, as capacity in the drainage system becomes available, the stormwater contained in the tanks will be pumped back into the Beacon Street 48-inch diameter pipe by two small underground pumping stations.

Following construction, the surface features on Beacon Street will be returned to pre-construction conditions. The City of Somerville will be proceeding in the near future with complete restoration (new pavement, curbs and sidewalks) of Beacon Street from Somerville Avenue down to Inman Square. Who is responsible for the Beacon Street Drainage Project?

Both the Cities of Cambridge and Somerville are responsible for the Beacon Street project. The Cities have entered into an agreement to construct a stormwater management system that will minimize the flooding that occurs along this area of Beacon Street and in the adjacent areas of Cambridge.

Superintendent's Plan to Consolidate Cambridge Schools excerpts from a letter to parents outlining the plan by Bobbie D'Alessandro

As you are all aware, during the past year I have been working with my cabinet to develop an elementary school consolidation plan. The recommendation to consolidate comes about after several years of declining elementary school enrollment. From school year 1997-1998 to school year 2001-2002 enrollment at the elementary school level declined by 681 students or 11.8%. Enrollment declines are further projected to continue for the next several years. This declining enrollment has led to the inefficient use of our facilities, and drains valuable financial resources from our classrooms and educational programs. Today at a student-teacher ratio of 20:1, there are 2,019 empty seats at the elementary level.

In order to keep you informed of our plans, I would like to let you know that I will be forwarding my elementary school consolidation and improvement plan to the School Committee on October 15, 2002. The major recommendations included in that plan to take effect September, 2003, will be as follows:

- •The Longfellow (minus the Intensive Studies Program), Amigos and King Schools will be merged at the King School building to form a new International Magnet School.
- The King Open School will move to the Longfellow School building.
- •The Intensive Studies Program will move to the Kennedy School building where it will remain intact as a part of the Kennedy School.
- Other program improvement initiatives will occur at selected other elementary schools. These initiatives will be undertaken with the goal of strengthening the education program and retaining or increasing elementary school enrollment.

Thursday, 11/7 at 7:00 PM Public Forum Tuesday, 11/12 at 7:00 PM Public Hearing Thursday, 11/14 at 7:00 PM Public Hearing Tuesday, 11/19 at 6:00 PM School Committee Vote (All are held at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School)

It is our goal that the School Committee will vote on the proposed elementary school changes at the School Committee meeting of November 19, 2002, so that work on the implementation of this plan could begin to ensure an orderly opening of school next September.

Cambridge Family and Children 's Services Mentorships

Volunteers are needed by CFCS for their Mentor Programs. Mentors are needed to spend time with either families in shelters or children from the Kennedy School in East Cambridge. Volunteers commit to build a relationship with a family over the course of a year, and spend on average 3-4 hours a week with the family.

The Parent-to-Parent Project matches mentors with families living in shelters. These volunteers should have experience working in a social service capacity, child care experience and have knowledge of the community or the state. The focus is on the parent, and mentors provide emotional support and encouragement.

The Kennedy School program seeks to create positive, long term relationships between mentors and at risk children.






