MINUTES FROM THE APRIL 13
COUNCIL MEETING:

Among the issues discussed at
the meeting were the following:

-A citywide organization of neigh-
borhood councils is reviewing
proposals for funding from the
various neighborhoods. A rep-
resentative from this community
is needed. Please call Smiley

COUNCIL NEWS Cont.

-A high lead level was found
in some soil samples taken
from area behind the Community
Center. More extensive sampling
will be done.

-People living near Sacramento
Field continue to be disturbed
by young adults who use the
field at night. Littering
is an ongoing problem. It was
suggested that the field be
closed after dark and that more
police presence be requested.

-A discussion of the use of play-
fields in the neighborhood
was proposed.

-Sacramento Field has been
sodded and no one should walk
on the grass until May

A member of the Mutual Aid
group submitted a proposal to
the Council for funding for
Senior Citizens' activities.
It was agreed to set aside some
council funds for trips,
classes, and other activities
for seniors. Smiley will meet
with the Mutual Aid group to
discuss this further.

A letter will be sent to the
Department of Human Services
outlining a proposal to start
a program for 5th and 6th
grade students.

COUNCIL NEWS Cont.

Many complaints were made about the disturbances in the neighborhood caused by patrons of Georgie's. A petition will be circulated, and people are urged to report all incidents to the police.

The Planning Committee reported to the Council the results of the meetings held over the past few months. The concerns about high rise buildings on Mass. Ave. that would reduce light, change the character of the avenue, and displace commercial establishments and services have led the Committee to favor zoning changes. Efforts to increase neighborhood awareness of these issues will continue, and the legal process for the zoning change will be initiated.

The possibility of building housing owned and operated on the Garfield Street site was discussed extensively. It was decided that residents in the immediate vicinity of the proposed building need to be made aware of plans. The Cambridge Housing Authority needs to begin negotiating with the city and the MBTA in order to acquire the site. Future Planning Committee Meetings will work on outreach and obtaining more specific information on both the proposed housing and the zoning changes along Mass. Ave..
