Neighborhood Council Notes.....

The council voted to appropriate \$75 for the Mutual Aid Seniors Group, located at the 1803 Mass Ave. for a Holiday Party.

The council agreed to see if there would be interest in and support for a project to present multicultural family holiday celebrations at the community center. Notices will be sent out through the school (see article in this months Whistler).

A committee from the neighborhood council has contacted Harvard Real Estate to propose the possibility of renovating the barn behind the community center as a multipurpose space with a focus on the performing arts. We have received word that Harvard is considering the project and will be in touch with us soon.

MT VERNON ST/MASS AVE DEVELOPMENT

Several neighbors reported back from meetings with Neighborhood 9 (across Mass. Ave. from Agassiz) Association and CDIA (Peter Wasserman's Company) to discuss CDIA's newest project on Mt Vernon St. and Mass. Ave. From the developers hand out, the general concept for Mt. Vernon St. is a 21 unit "townhouse development around cul-de-sac at end of Mt. Vernon. Smaller, less expensive units on 1820 side (as adjacent to 6 1/2 story apartment building. Larger, more expensive residences on northern side of Mr. Vernon..") Their idea is to dead end Mt. Vernon before it reaches Mass. Ave. At Mass Ave. the general concept for 41 units is a "retail strip at pedestrian level on Mass. Ave. with residential units above...three levels of housing above to be stepped back at each level. Four low or moderate income housing units would be proposed..."

After some investigation it was found that the Holiday Health Spa, which has a temporary building permit, does not have any permit for a neon sign. The council agreed to contact the Inspectional Services and ask them to see that the neon sign is removed.

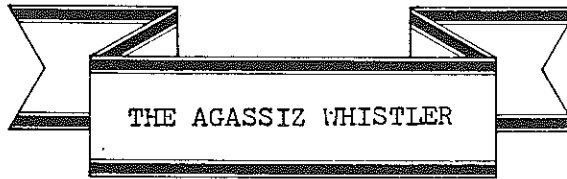
Frost Street Development

After the meeting it was brought to the attention of the council by residents that the underground parking spaces made available by Frost St. Associates for Newport Road residents are too small to meet code. Since these spaces cost up to \$75 per month, we have contacted Inspectional Services to verify this and see what can be done about it.

day. Call for dates of most convenient location.

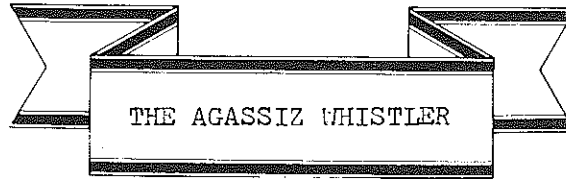
Several forms of identification will be required

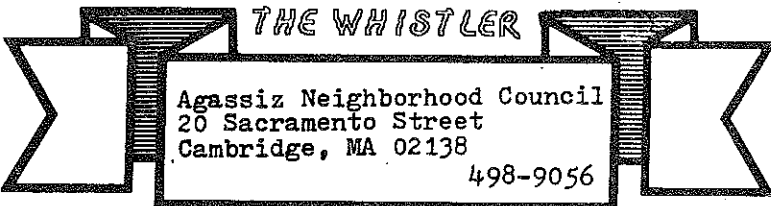
