Currently our major standing committees include Building, Parent Steering, Tot Lot Renovations, and Safety on Oxford Street.

We hope to reactivate our Planning Group, which is the group that spent a great deal of time on the Mass. Ave. Rezoning, which was passed last year. An important new job for this group will be to develop a land to reorganize the way the city handles developers. In ner January newsletter, City Councillor Alice Wolf had some thoughts regarding this committee, and this is what she had to say about Citizen Participation:

"City ordinances and the zoning code should be revised to mandate the following areas of citizen involvement:

Development of a neighborhood plan for each neighborhood that reflects neighborhood goals and specifically focuses on areas of potential conflict, especially between residents and commercial/industrial uses.

Citizen review of proposed large commercial or residential projects within the neighborhood, utilizing standards developed in the neighborhood plan.

Agenda. Organization of committee to study citizen involvement in commercial or large residential developments

A commitment to zoning recommendations that are developed through the neighborhood process and reflect the neighborhood plan.

City departments and boards should also be required to coordinate their consideration of projects with each other and with the neighborhood plan."



Sewer Upgrade - Phase 6 and 7

We have been notified by City Councillor Wolf that both phase 6 and 7 of the City's Sewer Rehabilitation project have been funded jointly by the state and the City of Cambridge. This is the project which will separate storm drains from sanitary drains and hopefully discourage flooding, particularly the more odious sewerage, in our neighborhood as well as North Cambridge. Black History Month Poster Contest and Family Event

The Cambridge Department of Human Services is sponsoring a poster contest for children in grades K-12; individual and group entries are welcome. Posters should stress the importance of historical events, and figures to the Afro-American experience, or the connection between the past, the present and the future. Areas to focus on might include: family, food, sports, music, church, fashion, politics, science, literature, entertainment, technology, art.

Individual entries should be on plain white paper, no larger than 11'x17". Group entries must be on plain white paper but of any size. All entries must have the name, phone number, and school of the person or group submitting the entry. Prizes will be awarded to 3 winners in each of 4 categories, and group entries will be judged in a separate category.

All entries will be exhibited at the Black History Month Family Celebration sponsored by the Department of Human Services on February 27 at 7 PM at the King School, 100 Putnam Ave. Winners will be announced that night, and winning entries will be used to publicize future Black History events and a calendar to be used as a fund raiser.
