

NOTES FROM THE NOV. 18 MEETING

Do Your Part For The 2010 Census

"Since 1790, the United States has conducted a census every ten years," explained Norman Eng. Mr. Eng, a Partnership Specialist with the 2010



Census and participant in the Complete Count Committee (community and government leaders dedicated to building awareness of the 2010 Census), told the Council about local strategies to get the word out about the importance of the upcoming census.

He stated, "Data collected from the decennial census affects the distribution of over \$400 million in government funds. An accurate count translates for dollars in your community, as well as in Congressional representation for your area and support for programs like Medicaid and school lunch programs."

The 2010 Census, comprised of just ten questions, was designed to be easy and quick to fill out, and doesn't ask for personal information such as household income or social security numbers. The forms will be mailed in March 2010. All residents will receive the short form, and a sample of the population will receive the longer American Community Survey that will be used to calculate trends. Census workers will be deployed to visit the homes of residents who do not return the form via mail.

Mr. Eng reiterated, "The census is important, safe, and confidential. Information collected is not shared with any other agency. Please advocate for the 2010 U.S. Census; be the center of influence in your community."

Q&A

- Q: How will the census reach segments of the population who might be reluctant to fill it out?
- A: The census attempts to reach residents through ethnic media, such as radio stations and newspapers, and through partnerships with leaders in ethnic communities.

Update on ANC/ABC Joint Committee

The ANC/ABC Joint Committee is an interim sub-committee that includes members of both the Agassiz Neighborhood Council (ANC) and the Agassiz Baldwin Council (ABC):

The sub-committee has met several times over the past year with the stated goal of clarifying and strengthening the relationship between the community, as represented by the members of the ANC, and the ABC organization, as represented by the Board of Directors. This is an interim effort. Once its goal has been achieved, the committee will be dissolved.

As summarized by Stephen Diamond and the Joint Committee:

Issues with communication between the Board and Council have developed as the agency has grown and expanded its citywide programs.. This was brought into focus when the Board of Directors changed

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harvardyard.com agassizcambridge.com the name of the organization (replacing the word "neighborhood" with "community" to better indicate the agency's citywide focus and constituency).

The agency's by-laws were written at a time when the Board didn't have the job of caring for a major building, running several large children's programs, or managing a nearly \$1 million operating budget. The ANC/ABC Joint Committee is now reviewing the name and by-laws. We will report our recommendations at an upcoming ANC monthly meeting in 2010, where we can have an open, public discussion of these important issues.

Living Well Network Update

"The Living Well Network is organized by ABC, but its resources come through the community," stated Nathaniel Meyer, Living Well Network (LWN) Volunteer Coordinator. "LWN operates as a volunteer system. My role is to identify individuals who may not yet require assistance themselves, but who want to contribute something to the betterment of the elders in our community. Since I started, I've been working to build this network that, in the future, will provide services."

Mr. Meyer provided a summary of LWN's efforts thus far:

Living Well Guide Distribution

This new but already popular reference guide has been circulated and will continue to be dis-



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tributed as needed. The Mayor's office recently requested 100 copies for area clergy members.

Scheduled Walks

LWN has organized several free walks including a bird walk in Concord, MA and a historical walk in the Agassiz neighborhood led by Charles Sullivan, Director of the Cambridge Historical Commission. Another bird walk is scheduled for May 2010. All walks have been led by volunteers.

Senior Computer Lounge

Located in North Hall, the Senior Computer Lounge has become a popular social space. Three volunteer teachers hold classes roughly every three weeks and the lounge is open for lab hours on days when formal classes aren't scheduled. Students are encouraged to suggest topics they would like to see covered in the class.

Snow Removal for Seniors

ABC is working with S&H construction to provide a discounted snow removal service.

Oxford Spa Tea Talks

These "Tea Talks" hosted at Oxford Spa are intended to create a space for seniors to get together to talk and be social. They will be held on the first Monday of each month at 9:30 AM. Oxford Spa provides the gathering space and free tea or coffee.

The first Tea Talk topic will be on a dinner club project initiated by Seddon Wylde, an active volunteer with LWN. The dinner club would connect volunteers with residents who are housebound or require cooking assistance. Other ideas for the Oxford Spa Tea Talks include a knitting group, discussion of city-related issues, a book or current event discussion group, and –prior to the bird walk scheduled for May 2010– a tutorial on bird watching.

Block/Street Captains

This program of LWN seeks to enlist block/ street captains who will identify residents who need assistance, communicate individual resident's needs to LWN, and lend their skills and knowledge to help provide the assistance offered by LWN.

Cambridge's Emergency Climate Congress

"In May 2009, Cambridge City Council recognized the climate emergency and the need for us to take steps to address it quickly," stated John Pitkin about the Emergency Climate Congress, convened by Mayor Denise Simmons. "If we delay, changes in our environment may become disastrous."

The Emergency Climate Congress will be held on Saturday, December 12, with a follow up meeting on Saturday, January 23. Mr. Pitkin, an organizer for the event, explained the event's origin and goals.

In September 2009, Cambridge City Council held a hearing with four scientists regarding climate change. Although Cambridge has had a program addressing climate change since 2002, it has been unable to meet the carbon reduction goals it originally set. Following the September hearing, the City Council decided to engage community leaders and groups in the city's process. Invitations were sent strongly encouraging community groups to nominate one or two delegates to serve as representatives to the congress.

The congress will include a discussion of Cambridge's current approach to combating climate change, as well steps moving forward. Representatives from each group will bring the results of the initial meeting back to their organizations to discuss. At the January 23 follow-up meeting, the representatives will provide feedback on their group's responses.

Mr. Pitkin stated, "We may be considering fundamental changes to the ways in which we organize our lives: how we light our streets, heat our homes, shop, and get our kids to school."

Following Mr. Pitkin's report, the Council nominated resident Ted Live to act as a delegate. ANC Continues to Request Crosswalk Markings at Oxford and Wendell

ANC members voted unanimously to forward a letter to Sue Clippinger of the Cambridge Department of Traffic, Parking, and Transportation, requesting that recognizable crosswalk markings be applied to the traffic-calming table at the junction of Oxford and Wendell. The letter follows a number of similar requests for improvements at the site, as well as a query from the Cambridge City Council to the City Manager's office about adding stripped crossings to all raised intersections in Cambridge.

BEACON STREET HOTEL PLANS

George Makrigiannis, who bought the lot at 371 Beacon Street in Somerville, plans to build a four-story, thirty-six room hotel with a sixty-seat restaurant. The plan includes a two-car drop-off area on Beacon Street. and underground parking for twenty-eight cars.

At several public meetings held in the last year, neighbors have expressed two concerns:

- First, when Mass Highway rebuilds Beacon Street in 2013, contaminated soil could create dust problems.
- Second, the hotel and restaurant will increase motor vehicle traffic congestion at this busy junction of Beacon and Oxford Streets.

Since the 1930s, the sole use on the site has been gas stations. Because some gasoline stored there has escaped in the past, some environmental remediation is required before construction begins. Most of this gasoline was pumped out in the 1990s; much of the rest is dissipating naturally. Loitherstein Environmental Engineering has ten years of test results on this site, including April and June 09. Holes were bored to the right depth for testing (and pumping, if necessary); these holes stay until DEP standards are met. The Phase II Environmental Report is on file at the Somerville Public Library.

The city of Somerville is eager to get this project moving and is satisfied with changes the

developer has made in response to comments from the city and neighbors.

This project will probably go before the Somerville Planning Board the first week in December, and to the Somerville Board of Zoning Appeal on December 16. The plan meets all requirements for the Somerville B-A Zoning District.

City Wide

WINTER SIDEWALK SAFETY

We all have a shared responsibility for keeping our community safe and accessible during winter weather. For you, your neighbors, people with strollers or using wheelchairs, and the many people in Cambridge who walk, please do your part. It's the law.

Cambridge Ordinance requires that all property owners remove snow from all sidewalks next to their property or business within twelve hours after snow stops falling in the daytime, and before 1 PM when the snow has fallen during the night.

Remember that, for people on foot, ice can be worse than snow. It can cause dangerous falls. You are as responsible for ice as you are for snow. The fine for failing to comply with the City's sidewalk clearance ordinances is \$50 a day each day that you don't comply. Even if you aren't around, it is your responsibility to ensure someone clears sidewalks and ramps next to your property.
