NOTES FROM THE OCT. 11 MEETING

Lesley University Threshold Program Improvements

George Smith, Lesley University's Director of Operations and Planning, and Jim Wilbur, Director of the Threshold Program, described plans for upcoming improvements to the Threshold Program's Oxford Street campus.

Threshold is a two-year, campus-based program for young adults with special needs. Its goal, according to Mr. Wilbur, is to provide a "safe environment for students to live independently, develop a rich social life, and have a job they feel good about doing."

Buildings slated for renovation include 63 Oxford, 78-80 Oxford, and 82 Front and Rear Oxford Street. Currently in the design phase, construction for the project is expected to begin

in summer 2012. Improvements include new or improved accessibility, updated interiors, and creation of a "mini-quadrangle."

This December, Lesley will apply to the Planning Board and Board of Zoning Appeals for the necessary variances and special permits, which include:

- Zoning relief to consolidate programs to a particular site
- Zoning variance to construct a new building
- Reduced parking

Lesley will contact the immediate abutters about the upcoming construction, as well as provide a more detailed report at the November ANC meeting.

Council members voiced their approval for Lesley's preliminary presentation of the project.

yourself gas money as well as adding destructive gases to the air, which is bad for the lungs and speeds global warming. Idling your vehicle for ten minutes a day uses more than twenty-five gallons of gasoline a year.



Massachusetts law (known as the “Anti-Idling” law) limits vehicle idling to no more than five minutes. The regulation applies to all motor vehicles, not just school buses.

What are examples of unnecessary idling?

- Sitting in your car with the engine running while you wait to pick up your child at school or another activity;
- Keeping the engine running to keep the heater or air conditioner going (your car will stay warm or cool for up to ten minutes on its own, or you can wait inside the building);
- Letting the engine run longer than five minutes to heat or cool the car (heaters and air conditioning units work faster when the vehicle is being driven);
- Letting the engine run to charge a cell phone.

Am I causing more pollution by stopping and starting the engine?

No. An idling engine causes more pollution by running than by stopping and starting up again. The car will produce more pollution idling longer than ten seconds than it will by shutting down and starting the engine.

Does it help the engine to “warm it up?”

No. Excessive idling is hard on your engine. Because the engine is not working at its peak operating temperature, fuel combustion is incomplete, which leaves fuel residues that contaminate engine oil and foul spark plugs.

Will I wear out my starter if I keep stopping and starting the engine?

No. More damage occurs to engines that are left idling over long periods of time.

What are some exceptions to the law?

- Running the engine to operate the windshield defroster to clear ice;
- Operating a refrigerator unit on a truck during delivery, wheelchair lifts, and other special equipment.

Update On City Snow Removal

Members of ANC have been working together with the Cambridge Commission for Persons with Disabilities to address issues with snow clearing in the city. As reported in previous editions of the Whistler, residents seek solutions in particular to issues with unshoveled sidewalks made impassable by snow and street corners piled high with snow deposited by city plows.

Fred Meyer, ABC Board Member, told the council, “Starting this upcoming winter, the city has agreed to take responsibility for clearing major streets’ corners.”

Council members discussed a variety of topics, including:

- Requesting that the city agree to clear all street corners as a first pass
- City organized clearing on all sidewalks offset by savings on required fire, police, and EMT responses
- Public/private collaboration to pay for sidewalk clearing
- Approaching the universities about extending the use of their snow removal vehicles and teams
- Piloting a public/private snow removal program in the neighborhood or in an apartment building with a large population of elderly residents
- Identifying critical travel paths in the neigh-

- neighborhood and reporting these to the city
- The snow removal service offered by ABC's Living Well Network
- Other strategies that utilize volunteers and discounted fee-for-service arrangements

PAINTING PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS

Have you wondered how the pedestrian crossing stripes are produced? Here is one way it is done.

It is near midnight on Prentiss Street. A large trailer truck carries sheets of solid white plastic. They are melted into a bright white liquid in the tank shown at the rear of the truck, and the liquid plastic flows down a chute into the striping machine.

The striping machine is carefully rolled along the pre-marked locations on the pedestrian crossings. Two passes of the machine produce the broad stripes. A sprinkling of glass beads before the plastic cures adds to the reflectivity of the stripe. The stripes are dry after just a few moments.



The result is clear, safer pedestrian crossings. The message of the stop sign is reinforced and the best accessible pathway is marked.

The Cambridge Public Library will host a living history of the Civil War from one of New England's largest Civil War re-enactor groups, the 22nd Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry.

The lawn in front of the library will be turned into Camp Cameron (Cambridge's Civil War barracks) where the re-enactors will portray army life on the march and in the field through first person demonstration, story, song, and poetry.
