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## Summary of September 21 ANC Monthly Meeting

This month's meeting included agenda items from the Porter Square Neighbors Association, Harvard University, Lesley University and Agassiz board member Steven Diamond, who also chaired the meeting.

1. The PSNA's Karen Klinger passed out a petition to stop the growth of the former Long's Funeral Home building in Porter Square. "Cut that behemoth down to size!" is the group's motto. The PSNA contends that the building's new owner is ignoring zoning laws and is making the structure taller than the law allows. The PSNA will present the petition and its argument at the BZA Hearing on Thursday, October 14 at 7 P.M. at the Citywide Senior Center.

2. Harvard University's architects guided attendees through a virtual tour of the university's new Northwest Laboratories. A PowerPoint presentation and scale model gave a clear picture of the structure's eventual visage. The presentation addressed concerns

about noise, traffic and construction (see story, page 2).

3. Lesley University outlined its plans to annex more space for student housing, and announced that it has issued an RFP (Request for Proposals) for the expansion of White Hall, at Everett and Oxford Streets.

The university continues its discussion with the MBTA over the air rights for the Porter Square station, and announced that Oak Tree has removed itself from the bidding (see story, page 2).

4. Agassiz board member Steven Diamond announced plans to continue to organize community members who are concerned about development along Mass. Ave. The group - including citizens from Agassiz, Neighborhood 9 and Porter Square - held its first meeting on Monday, October 4 to discuss their vision of the future of Lower Mass. Ave.

The group will draft a statement that it will present to the City of Cambridge, Harvard and Lesley.

## Harvard Unveils Plans for Northwest Building

The architects that are working on Harvard's new Northwest Laboratories project offered a detailed presentation at September's ANC meeting. Using a scale model and an elaborately animated PowerPoint presentation, architect Craig Hartman (Skidmore, Owings & Merrill) and landscape architect Laura Solano (Michael Van Valkenburg & Associates) walked neighborhood members through the 436,000 gsf structure, which is due to be completed in 2007.

Hartman said that the structure is now in the "design and development phase," and that the team is working to define its "definite massing and its look." Hartman allayed neighbors' concerns about a parking garage attached to the structure at the corner of Gorham and Hammond Streets. Neighbors had asked about the possibility of a visible intake valve, which Hartman said would be obstructed by mounding on the side of the structure.

The structure will be chiefly devoted to science laboratories and classrooms, with "as much program as possible below ground." That means that as much open space as possible will be extended northward.

Hartman's PowerPoint virtual tour outlined the structure's "integrative approach to sciences," linking the museum building and the laboratories into one cohesive structure.

The structure will feature a verdant Museum Quad, and the areas will be connected by a series of pathways. "The landscape has to bind everything together," said landscape architect Solano. "Circulation has to be very clear and [make for] a pleasant walk."

## Lesley Issues RFP for Expansion of White Hall

At September's ANC meeting, Lesley's VP of University Affairs, Paul Karoff, outlined the school's "long-range campus plan," which includes increasing the amount of on-campus student housing. A key component of this effort will be the expansion of the university-owned White Hall, located at the corner of Everett and Oxford Streets.

Karoff reported that the university had issued an RFP (Request for Proposals) to increase the building's residential capacity. Bids were due September 27. The university hopes to select a firm by mid-October, with construction planned from summer 2005 to September 2006.

The university also plans to take over all of 815 Somerville Ave. (it currently occupies a portion of the building) and 1663 Massachusetts Ave., which currently houses an Alamo Car Rental. It will also reclaim space on the second floor of the Porter Exchange, once the current occupant's lease ends later this year. The university has begun housing students in a building owned by the Episcopal Divinity School on Brattle St.

The continuing question of who will own the air rights over the Porter Square MBTA station also re-emerged. Oak Tree has removed itself from the bidding, and Lesley will continue its discussion with the MBTA.

Karoff explained that the plans for the expansion of White Hall include a refurbishing of the facade to make it more aesthetically pleasing, as well as the addition of two stories to make room for student housing. Karoff assured attendees that, despite the addition to the height of the structure, it would not exceed the height of nearby Harvard buildings (56 ft.).

Community members raised concerns about the level of noise caused by the construction, and by the ventilation system at White Hall. Karoff assured them that the university will maintain "a contract with Human Services to double-check the noise level."

The Lesley representatives emphasized that, as it is a construction project roughly one-tenth the size of Harvard's, the addition to White Hall will cause minimal disturbance to the community.

The museum yard will be populated by "high-limbed, deciduous trees." Solano described the Museum Quad as a "public landscape."

The Science Quad, on the opposite side of the structure, will be "playful, with seasonal interest." Some of the Hammond St. fir trees may be moved to help fill out this area.

The facility's North Lawn, set back 100 ft. from Hammond St., features a grove (perhaps of horse chestnut and hedge maples, among others) that will be "a threshold to the landscape," and provide "a fantastic view down Hammond St."

Hartman added that the structure as a whole, which will be composed of brick, wood and glass, will feature "landmark-quality architecture" that "extends the material fabric of Harvard, brick and stone, but also [connotes] sciences and the 21st century."

The structure, at its highest point, will be equal in height to 60 Oxford St. Hartman acknowledged the community members' noise concerns, tracing potential noise to three sources: 1) scientists and students, 2) Everett St. traffic into the facility's low-grade parking structure and 3) a mechanical structure on the roof of the building. Hartman said the challenge in designing this final component is that the shorter it is, the noisier it is, and that a quiet structure would have to be taller than 60 Oxford St.

Community members expressed concerns about mitigating noise during the construction of the complex. Harvard's Director of Community Relations, Mary Power, assured the crowd that "We have committed to having another community meeting before we meet with the planning board" to clarify this issue.
