ANC News

November 19 ANC Meeting

Doug Varden, ANC Board Chair, introduced Judy Kavanagh, from Public Relations at S.E.A. and Frank Ayotte, Project Manager for Montgomery Watson Harza (MWH). MWH and S.E.A. are the engineering team who'll be working on the Beacon St. drainage project. Frank can be reached at (617) 314-7117, Judy at (617) 498 4776.

A letter from both Cambridge and Somerville Departments of Engineering regarding a **community meeting on the Beacon Street Drainage Improvements Project at John F. Kennedy School in Somerville (backs up onto Elm Street near the Porter Square Shopping Center) on December 3 at 7:00 p.m;** and the Beacon Street Drainage Improvements Information Sheet was handed out. Frank gave a short presentation of upcoming Beacon Street sewer construction, which is scheduled to begin between January and March 2003. This project will continue the flood mitigation with construction of additional tanks to store overflow water.

He advised us that Beacon Street's gas main has already been re-located in preparation for the work to be done. The construction will in total cover 1,000 feet (Miller to Museum Streets), but only 300-500 feet at a time. This is the West side of Beacon Street (O'Sullivan's Pub side).

In a commendable partnership, Somerville and Cambridge have come together for this project with a shared vision:

- Improve quality of life
- Protect public health
- Serve future generations

The Agassiz-Harvard-City Working Committee

Recently, Agassiz neighborhood representatives, Cambridge city staff and Harvard representatives met together at the first meeting of the Agassiz-Harvard-City Committee, coordinated by the City of Cambridge. The working committee has been created to address concerns about the impact of development of the Harvard University campus in the area called the North Campus that is adjacent to the Agassiz neighborhood. Construction, environmental and traffic impacts are examples of concerns that will be addressed by the working committee during monthly meetings.

North Campus planning- important 12/17 meeting

Harvard University planning in the North Campus will be the main item on the agenda at the **December 17 Agassiz Neighborhood Council meeting.** (See below). Harvard's planners and architects will present the long-range planning approach for this area of the campus. The planning framework that establishes a system of open spaces and locations for future buildings was presented to Agassiz neighbors last winter and spring.

Continued from page 1 Beacon Street Sewer Construction

Project Objective:

This project will provide protection from a 25 year storm. (This is 2 1/2 inches an hour at peak.), and it will minimize community disruption during construction periods

Project Challenge:

Rain will go from existing drains into 2 storage tanks when rain exceeds the capacity of the drains. Once the storm ebbs, within a 12-24 hour period, water will be pumped back into the storm drains to flow out to the Charles River.

Project Construction:

Earlier tank construction on Wendell Street was curb to curb, however, the Beacon Street construction will use only half the street. During construction there will be alternate traffic and at night, traffic will resume as 2-lane driving. There will be no construction during rush hour to allow for 2-way driving both early and late. Both sidewalks will be open for walkers, although crosswalks may change due to construction.

Judy Kavanagh was introduced and told the council that the project will be confined to Beacon Street and will be finished in ten months. Traffic will NOT be routed into neighborhoods, but truck routes are unknown since the contractor has not yet been selected. Business along Beacon Street (especially those needing access to Shaws/Star Market) will feel the biggest impact. Parking will be restricted in front of Shaws/Star Supermarket to allow 2-way driving on Beacon Street, and Shaws/Star will allow dedicated parking (for residents who apply) overnight.

SEA will continue to "keep the communication flowing" with color-coded information. Safety remains as a major issue with programs to inform residents and children on appropriate "construction behavior."

Frank informed residents that following this construction, Mass. Highway (a state agency) is planning work from Inman Square to Porter Square (timeline places the start in late 2003 or early 2004.) Frank believed that the missing sidewalk near the American Academy of Arts and Sciences was included in the project. Judy encouraged residents to contact her office about items like this (617) 498 4776.

Project Monitoring

There will be an intensive monitoring plan on site to monitor every building for damage and stop construction immediately if any damage begins to appear. The City of Cambridge requires a sufficient insurance policy to cover any damage that might occur.

The vertical beams (to stabilize construction) have been ordered pre-cut to proper depth/size, to prevent vibrations. The sheeting will also be installed to minimize any vibrations (the plates will be pushed rather than slammed into the ground).

Judy and Frank urged everyone to attend the December 3rd meeting where plans and issues will be able to be addressed in more detail.

A.C.I.D. : Harvard Development in Agassiz

Miriam Goldberg and Dave Wood of A.C.I.D. gave a brief update of ACID activities including the neighborhood forum held on November 14.

A city-wide group is being formed to review development in the neighborhoods, to identify common patterns and common strategies used during construction/planning.

Specific concerns include loss of the museum collections to another location, traffic and parking impacts, possible effects on sewers and water, and construction disruption. These are difficult issues that will be solved only through coordination and cooperation between all parties: Cambridge, Agassiz and Harvard.

They reminded everyone that Harvard would be at the ANC meeting on December 17, with a presentation of plans for development in North Campus. The Law School plans are not well enough developed for presentation.

Since Harvard will be constructing I5 building over a 15 year period, there will be neighborhood amenities provided to Agassiz. A.C.I.D. has been particularly concerned with open space, and one suggestion was a science/educational program building which would include an open café to be built in the North Campus area to also provide community open space for mutual benefit.

CRIME IS UP

2002 Third Quarter Review Neighborhood 8 (Agassiz)

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The Agassiz neighborhood was hit with a series of both day and night **housebreak patterns** during the first quarter of 2002. There were an additional seventeen breaks recorded in the second quarter as apartment buildings on Wendell, Oxford and Sacramento experienced multiple breaks.

After the arrest of a career criminal from Somerville for a break on Oxford Street in July, the pattern appeared to have been eradicated. The professional type burglar was linked to numerous breaks, and only six scattered and unrelated incidents were recorded over the final eighty days of the summer.

There were **four street robberies** (+25%) in the Agassiz neighborhood in the third quarter. A series of three incidents on Hammond, Wendell and Oxford in late August were linked to three subjects who lived in the area on the Somerville line. These three pack robberies at knifepoint were all between the hours of 1 a.m. and 3 a.m. on weekend nights. Larceny from motor vehicles (+60%) increased dramatically in Neighborhood 8 over the summer months with 22 incidents reported. The predominant trend identified was late weekend night thefts with Oxford Street the hardest hit thoroughfare. The only drug arrest in the Agassiz neighborhood during the third quarter was an undercover arrest of an Arlington resident for "crack" cocaine.

Crimes between October 1 and November 14 included:

- Two auto thefts: both cars were Honda Accords stolen from the street
- One flim flam: people posing as refugees and religious persons convinced the victim to withdraw \$6,000 in order to get \$150,00. Victim was left with nothing.
- Five housebreaks: Two breaks were at the same building on Eustis, another was on Oxford St. where high end electronics were taken
- Six larcenies from automobiles: all but one occurred on a weekend, and windows were broken for access. Car stereos, change cell phones, and bags were taken.
- Two building larcenies were reported: a wallet was taken from a locker at Balley Fitness Center, and a palm pilot, wallet and briefcase was taken from the Baldwin School
- Four incidents of malicious destruction of property to cars; tires were slashed, pumpkins were smashed and magic marker was used to write on cars
- One street robbery: two males in their 20's held a victim down as they rummaged through his pockets and backpack.

PUMPS TO BE PLACED UNDER THE TOT LOT

In the ongoing initiative to mitigate the flooding conditions in the Agassiz neighborhood, the City will place pumps under the Tot Lot at the corner of Oxford and Sacramento Streets. This will slightly delay the planning process for the new Tot Lot that will be lead by the Community Development Department. Planning was originally scheduled to begin later in the new year. When planning begins, *The Whistler* will advise the community, and there will be opportunities to take part in the project.

On December 17, Harvard will present more information about the framework to engage in a discussion about future plans with the community. Two buildings in particular will be discussed - the north science building, which will be located along the north edge of the campus at Hammond Street, and the west science building, which will be interior to the campus visible from Oxford Street. Both buildings will help meet pressing academic and research needs in the sciences.

Harvard is planning to involve neighbors in a design process for these buildings, especially the north building that will complete the Hammond edge consistent with guidelines that were developed in concert with neighbors.

The Faculty of Arts and Sciences is also developing plans for an underground biological research facility to be located below the courtyard of the existing Biological Laboratories; and a physical sciences building, located adjacent to Gordon McKay, which will house research initiatives for the interdisciplinary study of mesoscale structures and materials. Harvard looks forward to bringing the plans to the community early next year.

Everett Street/Mass Ave

Harvard Law School will be assessing the feasibility of creating new academic space where the Everett Street garage stands. Harvard will work with neighbors to understand issues related to the impact of development and also opportunities to make the Law School campus a more attractive and welcoming neighbor. This "feasibility study" will also look at North Hall and Everett Street campus properties and will result in a planning framework to assist the Law School in understanding options for utilizing its campus. The Law School plans to involve neighbors in a series of community meetings throughout the study.

2002-03 du Pont Visiting Artist Lecture Series:
James Luna**

Native American artist, performer and educator James Luna will speak at The Art Institute of Boston at Lesley University on Dec. 5 at 7 p.m. in the second floor auditorium of the Art Institute of Boston at Lesley University. Luna is an installation and performance artist who uses traditional Native American art forms as well as surf music and video. He has performed or had work shown in such places as The Whitney Museum of Art in New York and the Smithsonian Institute's Museum of Natural History. Luna's monologues often spring from the art he creates, which may combine such materials as condoms, a tennis racket, a cellular phone and a buffalo horn.

Rigoberto Mena

Cuban painter Rigoberto Mena will speak at The Art Institute of Boston at Lesley University on Dec. 11 at 6:30 p.m. in the second floor auditorium of the Art Institute of Boston at Lesley University.

Mena has become one of the foremost painters of his generation. He experiments in his paintings and is known for his formal and eloquent use of color similar to that of Goya, Tamayo, Rembrandt, Barcelo, Rothko and others. His work has been described as "about fidelity, proverbial and enigmatic without diluting itself into transcendentalism or opacities that would cloud the vertical mirror in his studio in San Ignacio Street."

The Art Institute of Boston's du Pont Visiting Artist Lecture Series, established in 1993, is a multicultural series of public lectures and workshops featuring outstanding contemporary artists from diverse backgrounds.
